- 4. The Department believes that removal or treatment of the contaminated soil, and/or groundwater monitoring, are required on the Property under the authority of s. 292.11(3), Wisconsin Statutes.
- 5. On September 14, 2000, the Department sent a letter to Richard Christian advising him of the statutory requirement to restore the environment at that location. No response to that letter has been received by the Department.
- 6. On March 21, 2006, the Department sent a letter, by certified mail, to Richard Christian advising that a notice of contamination would be recorded if satisfactory action to restore the environment did not commence. That letter requested a written response by April 21, 2006. No response has been received by the Department.
- 7. On May 8, 2006, the Department sent a letter, by certified mail, to Richard Christian advising that the Department has made the decision to record a notice of contamination for the above-described property at the county Register of Deeds office.
- 8. Because the Department believes that petroleum currently found in the soil in the ROW adjacent to the Property will continue to discharge into the environment, subsequent purchasers of the Property could be held responsible for investigation and clean-up costs under s. 292.11(3), Wisconsin Statutes.
