#### INTRODUCTION:

This report provides documentation of the accomplishments achieved under AIS Control Grant AEPP-408-14 by the Oneida County Land and Water Conservation Department (LWCD). The grant was awarded to Oneida County by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR), and the original project period, within the contract, was between October 1, 2013 and December 31, 2014. However, an extension was granted by the WDNR on October 28, 2014, and the new end date of this project was set for June 30, 2015. This report also serves as the "Final Report" identified as a deliverable in the grant agreement.

The LWCD thanks the WDNR for their continued support of the County's AIS program. With assistance from the WDNR AIS grant program, Oneida County has been able to develop an active and very successful AIS program. Our program helps protect our invaluable water resources, creates a stronger and more connected community, and works towards a brighter future for our entire state. Without financial support from the WDNR grant program, Oneida County's AIS program efforts would be severely limited.

The concept of this project focused on collaborating and coordinating with interested entities working to protect our water resources within and surrounding Oneida County. Along those lines, the project contributed to raising public awareness about AIS through a variety of program activities described below.

This project was overseen by the Conservation/UWEX Education (CUW) Committee, with day-to-day activities developed and administered by Michele Sadauskas, AIS Coordinator. Additional support provided by Jean Hansen, Oneida County Conservationist, and Jonna Jewell, Administrative Assistant.

## Spiny Water Fleas Found in Butternut and Trout Lakes

The discovery of Spiny Water Fleas in local lakes is a tragedy. Butternut and Trout lakes are home to some of the best fishing and clearest waters in the



state. The invasives were discovered by alert anglers who found them on their fishing lines.

The fleas feed on zooplankton which feeds on algae – the result over time can be a negative

effect on water clarity. The native fish population has a difficult time eating the fleas because of their long, spiny tail.



Because these fleas are almost impossible to see, they are the most dangerous of invasives.



- 1. Call to Order: Meeting was called to order at 9:00am by Jean Hansen.
- 2. Chairperson Announcements: Jean announced Cathy Higley is the new Vilas Co Invasive Species Coordinator and will attend WHIP Meetings as of June.
- 3. Introduction of MOU partners and guests present No new Partners were in attendance. Christa mentioned Brent Matthews (DOT) will be replaced by Anna Wisner.
- 4. Approve meeting minutes from April. Amend number 4 to include Cheryl Todea's Title. Motion by Rod/John to approve the minutes with noted change. Motion carried.
- 5. Coordinator's Report Was circulated in advance. Of note is that Bill Jaeger was approved for an Invader Crusader Award.
- 6. Funding Opportunities update There was a suggestion that Rosie include the amount of hours she has left to work for each grant. Rosie will pursue 2015 GLRI funding for parts of Vilas and Oneida Counties and will seek clarification about the grant 'timing issue.' Rosie and Tracy will complete and submit the WPS grant application. Rosie will continue to search other funding opportunities including foundations. The 2013 WFLGP grant is completed and paperwork is turned in.
- 7. Jumping Worm Update: The DNR has outreach materials now available.
- 8. Garlic Mustard Grant Activities: Rosie explained she received pesticide use approval at the Lumberjack Exec Cmte Mtg and pulled at one site but found not enough growth at the other. Rod updated the group about the pull at another site and talked about the partnership with Conserve School. There were 13 students and four staff that hauled 12 bags and estimate they've cleared 95%. Rod and Rosie both had pictures available of their field days.
- 9. Invader Crusader Award: Given to Bill Jaeger
- 10. Citizen Monitoring Grant/Project W.O.W. update: Rosie has presented to Squash Lake Group, CBCW and Girl Scouts to spread the word about identifying and reporting using the GLEDN App and the WHIP Kits. Rosie has found that people are asking how to download the app and that is the whole point of the project.
- 11. WHIP Action Team Review: After much discussion the Steering Committee decided to pursue strategic planning before committing to Action Teams. It was noted that even though there won't be formal Action Teams at this time, members will continue to work while a strategic plan is being developed. Tom suggested that part of our strategy should be to ask partners what their issues are and invite them to a meeting to see what we can do to help them.

June 2015 Coordinator's Report Rosie Page

- 1. Bill Jaeger will attend our meeting to share with us his efforts battling invasives over the past few years.

  Bill just received his Invader Crusader award in the mail and we will do a photo opportunity at the meeting and release that to the media. He is interested in staying for our entire WHIP meeting.
- 2. Crandon Garden Fair May 16<sup>th</sup>: Delivered the invasive species message, on behalf of both WHIP and WRISC (they covered the expenses and mileage since e it is in Forest Co.). Had table and display, and fake invasive plants to show off. Interacted with approx 100 people and had good conversations including buckthorn removal, garlic mustard issues, the prevalence of spotted knapweed, and some plant ID including suspected Japanese Knotweed. One individual was selling forget-me-not, and vinca (periwinkle), otherwise all native species. Gardeners of the Northwoods were extremely welcoming and did not charge a fee for our booth.
- 3. May 22<sup>nd</sup>: Project WOW Training for Vilas Clean Boats Clean Waters Oshkosh staff and associated lake group reps. This was a fantastic afternoon at Trees for Tomorrow, arranged by Cathy Higley, to introduce the CBCW staff to various aspects of their jobs. I presented for approx 40 minutes, including an orientation to WHIP and training in the GLEDN app for reporting of terrestrial invasive species. They will be putting the app on their smartphones and in some cases borrowing our tablets. Will be working with Cathy to set up a borrowing schedule for our tablet kits, as several lake groups have expressed interest in officially mapping the terrestrial invasives at their landings/docks.
- **4. Wild Chervil treatment:** A site visit was completed 3 weeks ago with Bill Jaeger and Eric Kroening (Woodruff DNR), plants were 6 inches high. Eric returned to carry out treatment with Milestone (a broadleaf herbicide) June 16<sup>th</sup>. A summary will be submitted to Kelly Kearns at DNR for EDRR reimbursement before June 30<sup>th</sup>. I will be in touch with Eric and Bill about any needed restoration there.
- 5. WRISC Annual Meeting June 3<sup>rd</sup>: Attended this gathering at Florence Natural Resources Center. Excellent speaker presentations were similar to ours (in Feb) but reflected new updates (EAB and other threats to forests, Jumping Worm updates for the state, comparisons between spiny water flea infested waters in the north vs the south of Wisconsin). Helped Tony Summers teach session on the GLEDN app for the WRISC summer staff and some others. Obtained materials for outreach that will help WHIP in upcoming events. Also: LAWN SIGNS!
- 6. Science Educator's workshop at Kemp Natural Resources Center June 16<sup>th</sup>: A wonderful day at Kemp with a number of teachers and educators from across the county. I contributed a session on GLEDN mapping and how to use and borrow our tablet kits, as well as made several excellent contacts for outreach in upcoming months. Helped with invasive earthworm sampling also. Teachers have such heavy schedules- it is clear that

HWIP needs to address which educational standards our activities fulfill ("common core" or other). This will make it simpler for additional teachers to incorporate the topic of invasive species into their classrooms.

- 7. Student: I was contacted by a Lawrence College student, Mitchell Ives, Jr., who wants to become involved in the WRISC project documenting European Marsh Thistle but in the Rhinelander area. Will meet with him Friday late afternoon to discuss this. Our 2012 survey has thistles documented but he could revisit sites to distinguish various thistle species. He is very interested in focusing on a "before and after" treatment site following the removal of an invasive plant, so could perhaps tag along on the Wild Chervil follow-up visit.

- 8. Thursday June 18<sup>th</sup> will be a meeting for the Coordinators of the 3 north-eastern Wisconsin CISMAs, hosted by Lumberjack RC&D. Discussions will include shared grant opportunities, cooperative outreach efforts, sharing of resources, and successes/challenges. Updates and results to follow.
- 9. Jason Granberg and Brock Woods (DNR): are reaching out to regional partners across the state to check on sites for their Phragmites control project, and determine if sites need to be resprayed. We have: 1. Hwy 8 in Oneida County, 2. Wildwood Wildlife Park in Minocqua Hwy 70, and a spot up on Manitowish Lake. I know Michele S. Is more familiar with the Hwy 8 site than I am, but we need to discuss the other two sites and respond to Jason/Brock.
- 10. HOURS: I have roughly 40 hours remaining on our Lumberjack Coordinator Grant, and roughly 30 left on Project WOW (which will be used up over the next 2 weeks). Project WOW has some funds remaining for Equipment, so it will be spent on printer ink, toner, jump drives, cardstock for outreach, related items. As Tracy and I discuss the Strategic Plan for WHIP, I will begin to use up some of those hours (total WMA grant = \$8000 for strategic plan and improved outreach material such as website).

#### Oneida County Lakes and Rivers Association - Strategic Assessment

The meeting of the Oneida County Lakes and Rivers Association (OCLRA) Board of Directors that took place on Monday, April 21, presented a number of complicated issues. Numerous Board members expressed a high level of frustration with the lack of progress that has been made in educating the County Board on issues related to lakes and rivers, lack of success in reaching the public, and failure to maintain a consistent strategic direction from one month to the next.

In the days since this meeting took place, I have spent much time reviewing my notes from this and past meetings, as well as talking with members of the Board. The following is the outline of a potential strategic direction for the group to pursue that I feel addresses most of the concerns that have been brought up. This outline is merely a proposal that I feel integrates much of what has been said, and is intended to serve as a starting point for future discussion.

#### The Frustration

There appear to be four principle sources of frustration regarding the current direction of OCLRA. Different board members feel these different points to different degrees, but I believe all are present and real:

- 1. Lack of follow-through in starting and finishing projects (particularly in regards to presenting proposals to the Oneida County Board)
- 2. The status of Bob Martini (OCLRA President) as a "Lightning Rod" in the eyes of elected officials
- 3. Lack of engagement by the broader Lake loving public in organizational efforts
- 4. Failure during board meetings to stick to the planned agenda

I do not believe any of these problems to be intractable. Each can be effectively addressed

#### A Way Forward

OCLRA would alleviate its frustrations and carry out its mission most effectively by broadening its attention. So far, almost all of the groups attention has been focused on educating the Oneida County Board with the hope of generating improved policies related to lakes and rivers. This is a critically important strategy, and should not be abandoned. That being said, dialog with elected officials would likely bear more fruit if it were matched with a public engagement campaign.

#### Step #1: Completion of Study by Outside Expert

The first step the board should take is to pursue the study that has already been proposed, in which the outside expert with whom we have a relationship will explain the strengths and weaknesses of the Oneida County Shoreland protection ordinance. With this study in hand, the board can proceed to steps #2 and #3.

Step #2: Public Engagement:

Secondly, the board should take the information that is gained from Ms. Frisch's work and help the general public to understand it. There are many lake property owners as well as lake users who may not understand the technical and environmental issues associated with shoreland protection.

OCLRA should take the responsibility for educating the public on the following three points:

- 1. Why is Shoreland Protection important?
- 2. How does the current set of regulations in Oneida County compare to where it ought to be?
- 3. What should we be asking our leaders for?

These three points should be made in the news media, as well as during in-person presentations to lake associations, conservation organizations, neighborhood groups, Town boards, student groups, and anyone else who will invite our representatives to speak. There are many OCLRA board members with tremendous technical expertise and teaching ability, and these talents need to be put to the best use possible and not reserved solely for public comment at P&D meetings.

This public outreach effort will have two effects. First, it will allow the public to be better informed on the issues. Secondly, it will inspire some of those who hear the message to take action, either by speaking with their County Board supervisor, writing a letter, or possibly by joining OCLRA. Mobilizing public support will be key if step #3 is going to succeed.

Suggested Coordinators: Bob Martini (technical expertise), Joel Knutson (public organizing experience), Tim Brown (Educator)

#### Step #3: County Board Engagement

The same message that is carried to the public must be carried to the County Board, both to specific committees as well as to individual supervisors. There will be four principle ways in which the findings of Ms. Frisch's study should be communicated with the County Board.

- 1. A formal presentation to the Planning and Development Committee, similar to the presentations that will be given to the public.
- 2. Private conversations with key members of the County Board (chairman, and others) in which the main points of the study are communicated and a hard copy is made available
- 3. Public comment during P&D discussions related to shoreland protection by individuals who have come to care about the issue during our public presentations
- 4. Private communications (phone calls, letters) from members of the public to their County Board Supervisors

Suggested Coordinators: Bob Mott, Norris Ross (due to Bob's status as a CB Supervisor, and Norris' strong relationship with CB Chairman)

I anticipate that this short to medium term strategy will have the following effects:

- It will give the board a discreet project to focus on that gives shape and direction to conversations that often move in circles
- It will eliminate the "lighting rod" problem as it will mobilize new voices within the
  community to speak to these issues, possibly allowing the County Board to understand these
  issues in a new light
- It will fulfill the part of the OCLRA mission that deals with educating the public on lake issues. This element of the mission has not been closely pursued in recent months
- This plan will NOT address the issue of meetings that fail to stick to the agenda. It is up to
  the board to determine how to conduct its meetings in a way that accomplishes the
  necessary businesses and avoids needlessly exacerbating its members with circular
  conversations

Again, these thoughts are intended to kick start a discussion, and not to propose what I consider to be the only possible solution.

It is imperative that whatever strategy is adopted include:

- 1. Measurable goals
- 2. Named individuals who are responsible for specific tasks
- 3. A specific calendar

#### 1D. Partner with management agencies, scientific organizations, and academia. (\$140.00)

In 2014 and 2015, the Oneida County AIS team had multiple opportunities to partner with management agencies and academia.

During the 2014 field season, the Oneida County AIS Coordinator continued to serve as the coordinator for installing WDNR signage at boat landings throughout the county. Seven new signs were installed at local landings. Landings at Flannery, Perch, McNaughton, West Horsehead, Goodyear, Town Line, and East Horsehead lakes received updated WDNR signs.

A 2013 collaboration between Ted Ritter (Vilas County Invasive Species Coordinator) and Michele Sadauskas (Oneida County AIS Coordinator) resulted in the development of fishing license holders. In 2014, LWCD staff distributed over 2000 of these much-beloved outreach pieces.

Additionally, Oneida County participated in the '4<sup>th</sup> of July Landing Blitz', 'Draining Campaign', 'Bridge Snapshot Day' (River Alliance) and a CBCW Special Project that was led by Erin McFarlane. This study was conducted over multiple weekends at Madeline and Stella Lake landings.

Some mileage was incurred for the above projects (Tab 2A and appendix E).

Thank you for your timely responses to our request for lists of landings for the CBCW Special Project! The five landings below have been randomly selected as the data collection sites in the North Central study area. Each landing has been randomly assigned a day of the week (Friday, Saturday, or Sunday) on which the data needs to be collected, and three specific weekends during which data collection can take place: July 25-27, Aug. 8-10, and Aug. 22-24. Please select one of the three dates listed after the landings in the table below to go out and collect data. If weather causes the data to have to be collected all in one weekend, that's ok – but it is important that the data be collected on one of the dates specified for each landing.

Only 3 hours should be spent at each landing, giving us a total of 15 hours per study area for this special project. 

#### WISCONSIN ANGLERS ARE PULLING THE PLUG ON INVASIVE SPECIES

Most of Oneida County's boaters and anglers are old pros at pulling plants and animals off their boats at the landing to stop the spread of aquatic invasive species. But some invaders like zebra mussel larvae or spiny water fleas are too small to see and can survive to the next lake when water is left in live wells, buckets, bilges, motors or other equipment. This summer, more than ever, boaters are remembering to drain water from their bilges, live wells and buckets.

As the summer season picks up, invasive species experts like AIS Coordinator Michele Sadauskas and her team, Stephanie Boisemenue, Alyssa Nycz and Sara Mills, will be reminding anglers and boaters to drain their boats this summer before hitting the road. This year, the Draining Campaign will remind water users that Wisconsin invasive species law prohibits transporting water between lakes.

Volunteers are sharing this message with a friendly smile and something to help anglers keep their catch fresh on the road home once the water has been drained: ice packs. In response, lake lovers are proving ready to help. In 2013, after just one summer of the campaign, 82 percent of Wisconsin boaters reported that draining water is a step they take to prevent invasive species, a 9 percent increase from 2012. The requirement to drain water is closely tied to another Wisconsin invasive species law – that wild, live fish can't be transported without a permit. However, once your day's catch is out of water, the fish aren't considered live and can be safely transported home. Sadauskas advises, "to keep fish fresh on the drive home,
