Project Goals and Objectives

- The primary objective of this project was to build community awareness and appreciation of the East and West Twin watersheds.
- Outreach and education will focused on tools to address priority issues including agricultural runoff's impact on groundwater and surface water quality, invasive species, fish passage barriers, loss of forested and wetland riparian buffers, urban run-off and lack of water quality and biological assessment data.
- Collection of water quality data will support agency and non-profit organization led efforts to address impairments within the watersheds.

Beach Clean Up

WAV Monitoring Training

Jim Knickelbine, Director of the Woodland Dunes Nature Center in Two Rivers, conducted Water Action Volunteer (WAV) training for FOTR leaders and partners on April 22, 2017. Wendy Lutzke assumed those responsibilities in summer 2018.

These training sessions provide written methods, classroom instruction, and hands-on field training for measuring the six WAV parameters: dissolved oxygen, temperature, turbidity, stream flow, habit, and macroinvertebrates to assess water quality.

Plans are in place to then train teachers and their students the methods at several area middle and high schools including Denmark High School, Mishicot High School, Roncalli High School, Kewaunee Middle School, and Two Rivers High School. Expanding WAV sampling throughout the area will help provide a more comprehensive picture of water quality trends in the East and West Twin Rivers.
