AIS Surveillance

In addition to CBCW inspections, regular AIS surveillance at the boat landings occurred through a contract with Aquatic Engineering. Endangered Resource Services completed pre and post monitoring of curly leaf pondweed treatment areas (12 acres). ERS also found purple loosestrife on private property near the Balsam Lake Village Beach when conducting a point intercept survey for the lake in July 2009. Polk County LWRD staff were contacted, and the plants were removed and treated with herbicide. These activities were not charged to grant AEPP-073-07.

Clean Boat and Clean Waters (CBCW) 2009

We completed our third year with the Clean Boats and Clean Waters (CBCW) program for Balsam Lake. This success was achieved with the help of Unity High School students who signed up to work both volunteer and compensated hours.

We started 2009 as in past years with opening of fishing on May 2^{nd} at all four public landings on the lake. Included were Balsam Lake Village Beach, 46 Store, East Balsam, and Little Balsam. We ended our 2009 season on August 31^{st} (weekend before Labor Day). This gave us great satisfaction knowing that all four of our public landings had volunteers to work the CBCW program that included boat and trailer inspections, data collection, and AIS information distribution. We changed our schedule from previous years to include off hours during the week (10 - 2 and 12 - 4) for Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Saturday hours were 8 - 4 and Sunday hours were 12 - 4.
